ACCEPTABLE ITEMS FOR RECYCLING

Iowa Waste Exchange - Marshall County Recycling

#1, #2, & #5 Plastic Containers

- Rinse the container. Plastic containers must be clean and free of any food, drink, or soap residue!
- You may leave any labels on, but remove any nozzles, lids, and rings and put them in the trash.
- No plastics that previously contained motor oil or hazardous waste These must be clean, dry, and then may go in the trash.
- No syringes in recycling bins even if they are put into a plastic jug!
- No shipping plastics, bread sacks, water bottle packaging, paper towel and toilet paper packaging, etc.- These items can be recycled at local stores, along with your grocery bags, but not in your curbside bin.
- No plastic utensils, straws, or cups.

Clear Glass Food Containers

- Rinse clean No food, drink, or soap residue
- Lids, rings, and broken glass go in the trash.
- No glass baking dishes, cups, plates, serving dishes, etc.
- No broken glass or any glass that is not a jar or bottle.

Paper Products

- Newspapers & paper items included with newspapers, magazines, catalogs, phone books, and junk mail can be put into a clean plastic grocery type bag/sack (we will remove it when sorting) - but a paper sack is best!
- No plastic magazine covers, plastic newspaper sleeves, or shredded paper.
- No dirty or soiled paper products these go in the trash.

Tin Cans

- Cans must be empty, rinsed clean, and labels removed.
- Toss any loose lids into the trash.

Corrugated Cardboard and Paperboard

- Cardboard shipping boxes, shoe boxes and gift boxes Must be clean and flattened.
- Cardboard toilet paper, paper towel and gift wrap cores.
- No wax coated or soiled cardboard/paperboard—ex. Pizza boxes.
- Boxes that have not been broken down or flattened will not be accepted.
